Jacaranda mimosifolia
Well known for their profuse purple flowers in late spring. Jacaranda are hardy and tolerate to a wide range of conditions. Carnaby's cockatoo feed on the seeds of Jacaranda trees between May and August.



Banksia prionotes

The woody 'cones' of the Acorn Banksia are an excellent food source for Carnaby's cockatoo. The smaller dimensions (2m H x 2m W) of Ban. prionotes 'Dwarf' are ideal for areas with limited space. Flowers in Autumn.

Hakea laurina

The Pin Cushion Hakea is a small ornamental tree ideal for windbreaks and as a street tree. The large woody fruits provide food for hungry cockatoos in late spring-summer.

With their breeding and feeding areas decimated, replacing habitat and lost food sources across the city is a key priority in looking after these iconic birds.

Conservation action and breeding programs are being implemented but on our own smaller/individual level we too can help.

This flyer includes plants we grow seasonally that are suitable for home gardens and verges that Black Cockatoos love.

Eucalyptus erythrocorys

A popular ornamental gum that is easy to grow. It is hardy, fast growing and has interesting bark along with trademark flowers and seed capsules.

Hakea orthorrhynca

Large woody, beak shaped pods follow bright red interesting flowers in winter.

Hakea multilineata

Stunning pink flowers in winter to spring. Providing food for birds, producing beautiful flowers and with low flammability this Hakea is a bonus to any situation.
